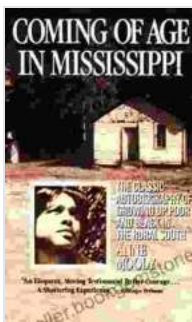


# Coming of Age in Mississippi: A Journey of Self-Discovery, Resilience, and Hope

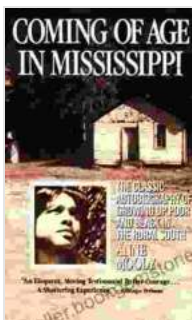
