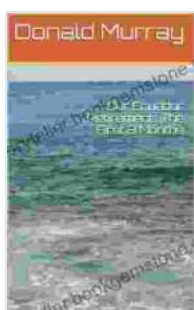


# Our Ecuador Retirement: The First Months
